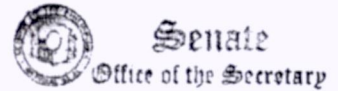

AN ACT  
MANDATING THE INSTITUTIONALIZATION, DEVELOPMENT, TRAINING, ORGANIZATION AND ADMINISTRATION OF BASIC RESERVE OFFICERS TRAINING CORPS (ROTC) IN GRADES 11 AND 12 IN PUBLIC AND PRIVATE EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS, FURTHER AMENDING REPUBLIC ACT NO. 7077, OTHERWISE KNOWN AS THE "CITIZEN ARMED FORCE OR ARMED FORCES OF THE PHILIPPINES RESERVIST ACT", AS AMENDED BY REPUBLIC ACT NO. 9163, OTHERWISE KNOWN AS THE "NATIONAL SERVICE TRAINING PROGRAM AND APPROPRIATING FUNDS THEREFOR

*Be it enacted by the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled:*

1       **SEC. 1. Short Title** - This Act shall be known as the "**Senior High**  
2 **School Reserve Officers Training Corps (ROTC) Act**".

3       **SEC. 2. Declaration of Policy.** - It is the policy of the State to serve  
4 and protect the people. The government may call upon the people to defend  
5 the State and, in fulfillment thereof, all citizens may be required, under  
6 conditions provided by law, to render personal, military or civil service. The  
7 State recognizes the role of the youth in nation-building and shall promote

1 and protect their physical, moral, spiritual, intellectual and social well-  
2 being. It shall inculcate in the youth patriotism and nationalism, and  
3 encourage their involvement in public and civic affairs.

4 Towards this end, the State shall enhance the capacity of the nation  
5 to produce the needed manpower and to expand its human resources in  
6 times of war, calamities and disasters, national or local emergencies, and in  
7 support to the Government's law enforcement strategy against crimes by  
8 creating a pool of trained reservists.

9 **SEC. 3. Definition of Terms-**

- 10 a) *Reserve Force* – refers to the organization of trained reservists  
11 under the command of the Armed Forces of the Philippines who  
12 may be called for duty in the event of war, invasion or rebellion; to  
13 assist in relief and rescue during disaster or calamities; to assist  
14 in socioeconomic development; and to assist in the operation and  
15 maintenance of essential government or private utilities in the  
16 furtherance of overall mission.
- 17 b) *Basic Reserve Officers' Training Corps (ROTC)* – refers to a  
18 mandatory two (2) year basic leadership and military training  
19 program for students enrolled in Grades 11 and Grades 12 in all  
20 senior high schools in public and private educational institutions.
- 21 c) *Advance ROTC* – refers to the optional and enhanced ROTC course  
22 that is offered in universities, colleges, vocational schools and  
23 other tertiary institutions.
- 24 d) *Clustered ROTC Unit* – refers to two or more educational  
25 institutions that are strategically grouped together for the purpose  
26 of holding ROTC classes in one location.
- 27 e) *Grievance Committee* – refers to an independent body that is  
28 tasked to investigate any complaint or allegation of abuse, violence  
29 or corruption in any clustered ROTC unit or any educational  
30 institution implementing the ROTC Program.
- 31 f) *National Grievance Committee* – refers to the appellate body that  
32 has jurisdiction to hear appeals on the findings and  
33 recommendations of any local grievance committee.



- 1 g) *Public Educational Institutions* – refer to educational institutions  
2 that are established and administered by the government.
- 3 h) *Private Educational Institutions* – refer to educational institutions  
4 maintained and administered by private individuals or groups.
- 5 i) *Registration* – the act of recording the name and/or other relevant  
6 information of the students who have completed the ROTC  
7 Program in Grades 11 and 12 on the official list of ROTC  
8 graduates. *Provided*, that the registration that is referred to under  
9 this Act shall not be construed as enlistment in the AFP Reserve  
10 or Regular Force.

11 **SEC. 4. Coverage.** - The conduct of basic military and leadership  
12 training under the ROTC shall apply to all students in Grades 11 and 12 in  
13 all senior high schools in public and private educational institutions.

14 **SEC. 5. Establishment of the ROTC Program in all Public and**  
15 **Private Educational Institutions.** –

16 a. There is hereby established a mandatory two (2) year Basic ROTC  
17 program for students enrolled in Grades 11 and 12 which shall form part of  
18 the basic curricula for the Senior High School Education in any public and  
19 private educational institutions in pursuance to the provisions of the  
20 National Defense Act, Revised Administrative Code of 1987, and the 1987  
21 Constitution, with the objective of producing well-trained and prepared  
22 reservists for military and civic service. The ROTC training is aimed to  
23 instill patriotism, love of country, moral and spiritual virtues, respect for  
24 human rights and adherence to the Constitution.

25 b. The Basic ROTC, instituted as part of the curricula shall be  
26 administered in accordance with the following modules:

- 27 b.1. Enhancing the students consciousness in the ethics of service,  
28 patriotism and nationalism, respect for human rights, appreciation  
29 of the role of national heroes in the historical development of the  
30 country, strengthen ethical and spiritual values, develop personal  
31 discipline and leadership and to encourage creative thinking for  
32 scientific and technological development;

1           b.2. Basic military training for students in order to motivate, train,  
2           organize and utilize for national defense preparedness or civil-  
3           military operations: *Provided*, That no student below the age of  
4           eighteen (18) years shall take a direct part in hostilities.

5           b.3. Civic training for students in order to be active participants and  
6           volunteers for the development and improvement of health,  
7           education, ecology and environmental protection, human and civil  
8           rights awareness and law enforcement.

9           b.4. Preparedness during actual disaster response operations on  
10          needs assessment, improved skills for search, rescue and relief  
11          operations, and early recovery activities. Integration of capacity-  
12          building activities revolving around risk-related situations in order  
13          for students to be proactive in lessening the socio-economic and  
14          environmental impacts of disasters including climate change. These  
15          capacity building activities will help build understanding and skills  
16          with the end in view of applying disaster risk reduction and  
17          management principles, concepts, and concrete action steps  
18          towards building their resilience.

19          c. Any student who fails to undergo the mandatory Basic ROTC in  
20          accordance with this Act shall not be qualified for graduation. In addition  
21          thereto, the non-taking of ROTC by any student shall be a ground for  
22          Compulsory Military Training in pursuance to Section 14 of Republic Act No.  
23          7077. Any educational institution that fails to institute and implement the  
24          Basic ROTC program in pursuance to this Act shall be subject to  
25          disciplinary and administrative sanctions as the Department of Education  
26          (DepEd) may impose.

27          d. Guided by the provisions of Section 5(b) hereof, the DND and the  
28          DepEd, in consultation with other relevant government agencies and private  
29          stakeholders as the Secretary of National Defense may determine, shall  
30          design and formulate the Program of Instruction (POI) on the Basic ROTC  
31          program in Grades 11 and 12.

32                 **SEC. 6. Schools as Zones of Peace.** – Pursuant to Republic Act No.  
33          11188 entitled “*Special Protection of Children in Situations of Armed*

1 *Conflict*”, every educational institution implementing the ROTC under this  
2 Act shall comply with the declaration and guidelines that are provided for  
3 under the said law to maintain the neutrality of the schools as zones of  
4 peace.

5 **SEC. 7. Students Exempted from this Act.** – The following may be  
6 exempted from the coverage of this Act:

7 a. Those who are physically or psychologically unfit, as certified by  
8 Armed Forces of the Philippines (AFP) Surgeon General or his authorized  
9 medical officer, in pursuance to the recommendation of the educational  
10 institutions where the concerned student is enrolled.

11 b. Those who have undergone or are undergoing similar military  
12 training.

13 c. Those who were chosen by their school to serve as varsity  
14 players in sports competitions.

15 d. Those who may be exempted from training for valid reasons as  
16 approved by the DND, upon recommendation by any educational institution.

17 **SEC. 8. Advance ROTC.** – The basic ROTC established in Section 4,  
18 paragraph 1 of RA 9163, also known as the “*National Service Training*  
19 *Program (NSTP) Act of 2001*”, as a component of the NSTP which forms part  
20 of the curricula for students of any baccalaureate degree course shall be  
21 modified or reclassified as the Advance ROTC pursuant to Section 39 of RA  
22 7077, or the “*Citizen Armed Force or Armed Forces of the Philippines*  
23 *Reservist Act.*”

24 The Advance ROTC in the tertiary level shall continue as an optional  
25 and voluntary component of the NSTP. Students who volunteer for the  
26 Advance ROTC program in universities, colleges, vocational schools and  
27 other tertiary institutions shall remain to be governed by RA 9163 insofar as  
28 they are consistent with this Act.

29 The provisions of Section 42 and 43 of Republic Act No. 7077 in terms  
30 of training, uniforms and supplies, and the scholarship incentive shall  
31 remain effective and applicable for those accepted in the Advance ROTC  
32 course. It shall be mandatory for all public and private universities, college  
33 and similar learning institutions to offer and provide a training school for

1 the Advance ROTC program which shall have a duration in accordance with  
2 the curriculum prescribed by the DND and the Commission on Higher  
3 Education (CHED).

4 The Department of National Defense, in coordination with the CHED,  
5 shall prescribe the curriculum for Advance ROTC and the program of  
6 instruction in pursuance to the applicable provisions of Republic Act No.  
7 7077.

8 **SEC.9 Organization, Operation and Maintenance of ROTC Units.**

9 – The organization, operation and maintenance for the establishment of the  
10 Basic ROTC shall be in accordance with Sections 41 and 42 of Republic Act  
11 No. 7077 which shall remain effective and operative unless inconsistent with  
12 this Act. The Secretary of National Defense, in consultation with the DepEd,  
13 shall prescribe the organization and operational manual of ROTC units in  
14 public and private educational institutions for Grades 11 and 12:  
15 *Provided*, that such educational institutions shall be required to provide an  
16 adequate office for the ROTC administrative staff assigned thereat.

17 The AFP shall create an office dedicated to the supervision and  
18 administration of the ROTC program within the Reserve Commands of the  
19 AFP in coordination with the DepEd.

20 **SEC. 10. Registration in the Reserve Force.** – Pursuant to Sec. 14  
21 of Republic Act No. 7077, a student who has completed the Basic ROTC  
22 program in senior high school shall be registered in the Reserve Force only  
23 upon reaching the age of eighteen (18).

24 **SEC. 11. Guidelines to safeguard students of the Basic ROTC**  
25 **Program.** - In order for the proper and effective implementation of the Basic  
26 ROTC Program, the following policies shall be adopted to prevent the  
27 occurrence of hazing, corruption and other forms of abuses:

- 28 a. The Basic ROTC Program prohibits hazing as defined under **R.A.**  
29 **8049, as amended by R.A. 11053**, and as such, adopts the  
30 penalties for any act committed under the provisions of the said law;  
31 b. Cognizant of the provisions under **R.A. 7610** or the “*Special Protection*  
32 *of Children Against Abuse, Exploitation and Discrimination Act*”, any  
33 physical, sexual or psychological abuse, emotional maltreatment, or

- 1 any act by deed which tends to degrade or demean the dignity of a  
2 child/student is prohibited;
- 3 c. Consistent with **DepEd Order No. 40, Series of 2012 on Child**  
4 **Protection Policy**, the Basic ROTC Program proscribes physical,  
5 humiliating or degrading punishments or penalties by a teacher,  
6 school administrator, an adult, or any other child who has been given  
7 or has assumed authority or responsibility for punishment or  
8 discipline for an alleged or actual offense for the purpose of discipline,  
9 training or control **except** for mild to moderate physical exercises  
10 such as push-ups, sit-ups and running within the medically  
11 recommended limit for the concerned age group;
- 12 d. In case of the School Officials or employees of public or government  
13 educational institutions, who shall accept any gift from any student,  
14 or from any parent/guardian of the student, or who shall commit  
15 other practices contemplated under **R.A. 3019 on "Graft and**  
16 **Corrupt Practices Act"** and the **Revised Penal Code on Bribery**  
17 **and Corruption** the maximum penalty shall be imposed;
- 18 e. The penalties provided under the **Revised Penal Code for the**  
19 **Crimes of Bribery and Corruption** shall be imposed upon school  
20 officials or employees of private educational institutions who shall  
21 accept directly or indirectly, any gift, in cash or in kind, from any  
22 student, or from any parent/guardian of the student in relation to or  
23 pertinent with the conduct of the Basic ROTC training program.

24 **SEC. 12. Establishment of Grievance Committees. –**

- 25 a. A Grievance Committee shall be formed from a cluster of  
26 educational institutions that shall receive complaints and/or *motu*  
27 *proprio* conduct investigations on any complaint or allegation of  
28 abuse, violence or corruption in any educational institution  
29 implementing the Basic ROTC Program;
- 30 b. Every Grievance Committee shall be composed of three members,  
31 to be chosen by the Secretary of National Defense and the  
32 Secretary of Education: *one (1) District Commandant from the DND,*

1           one (1) District Schools Supervisor from the DepEd, and one (1) Legal  
2           Officer from the DepEd;

- 3           c. The DepEd and the DND shall formulate the manner by which the  
4           educational institutions implementing the Basic ROTC shall be  
5           clustered for the efficient resolution of grievances;
- 6           d. The Grievance Committee shall function as an independent  
7           investigative body, which shall formulate the recommendation to  
8           the proper disciplinary authority that has jurisdiction over the  
9           respondent, depending on whether he/she belongs to the military  
10          for which purpose, the Articles of War shall be employed. Whereas,  
11          for school officials and/or employees of public and private  
12          educational institutions, the provisions of **R.A. 6713 or the Code**  
13          **of Conduct of Public Officers and Employees** and other relevant  
14          laws on the matter shall be applied. This is without prejudice to  
15          administrative cases that may be filed pursuant to the Civil Service  
16          rules for public officers and employees involved in the complaint.
- 17          e. Nothing herein shall prevent any person from filing directly with  
18          the regular courts any incident of violation of *Republic Act 11053 or*  
19          *the Anti-Hazing Act of 2018.*

20           **SEC. 13. Powers and Duties of the Grievance Committee** – In view  
21          of the laws providing protection for children, every Grievance Committee  
22          shall be pro-active in its duty to:

- 23           (1) Encourage the reporting of any incident of hazing, violence, abuse and  
24           corruption in every clustered ROTC unit;
- 25           (2) *Motu proprio* or upon a complaint filed by any person, investigate, any  
26           act of hazing, violence, abuse and corruption in the clustered ROTC  
27           unit;
- 28           (3) Issue preventive suspension orders against officers of the ROTC or any  
29           school employee involved in the training within three (3) days: (a)  
30           upon receipt of the complaint, or (b) after initiation of the *motu*  
31           *proprio* investigation, to preclude him from exerting undue influence  
32           over the complainant and impede the normal course of the  
33           investigation;

- 1 (4) Recommend the appropriate action for any offense committed in the  
2 clustered ROTC unit to the proper disciplinary authority which has  
3 jurisdiction over the respondent within fifteen (15) days (a) upon  
4 receipt of the complaint, or (b) after initiation of the motu proprio  
5 investigation;
- 6 (5) Monitor all complaints filed with the Committee and maintain an  
7 updated record of the status of each case;
- 8 (6) Provide the parties of the complaint its findings and recommendations  
9 within thirty (30) days upon receipt thereof.
- 10 (7) Promulgate rules and regulations necessary to carry out its objectives,  
11 functions and disciplinary procedures;
- 12 (8) Performs such other functions as may be provided by law.

13 **SEC. 14. National Grievance Committee.** – There is hereby  
14 established a National Grievance Committee (NGC) composed of the  
15 Secretary of National Defense or his permanent authorized representative,  
16 the Secretary of Education or his permanent authorized representative, and  
17 the Secretary of Justice or his permanent authorized representative.

18 The NGC shall receive appeals on petitions for review from the  
19 findings/recommendation of any of the Grievance Committees. It shall  
20 provide the parties of its decision within fifteen (15) days, counted from the  
21 time of receipt of the petition. Any resolution of the NGC shall be final.

22 **SEC. 15. Incentives for Undergoing the ROTC Program.** – a.  
23 Subject to other requirements that may be prescribed by rules and  
24 regulations, graduates of the Advance ROTC shall be eligible for  
25 commissionship/lateral entry and enlistment in the AFP, Philippine National  
26 Police (PNP), Philippine Coast Guard (PCG), Bureau of Jail Management and  
27 Penology (BJMP), and Bureau of Fire Protection (BFP) unless a waiver is  
28 issued by the Department Secretaries of the aforementioned military and  
29 civilian armed forces.

30 b. Students undergoing the Basic ROTC and those accepted in the  
31 ROTC Advance Course shall be provided with free hospitalization in any  
32 government hospital in case of accident or injury during the training.

1 Mandatory insurance for students undergoing ROTC shall be provided by  
2 the school where the students are enrolled.

3 c. Students undergoing the Advance ROTC shall be given access and  
4 privileges with any AFP Commissary. The Chief of Staff of the Armed Forces  
5 of the Philippines shall issue the necessary regulations for the  
6 implementation of this privilege.

7 **SEC 16. Classification of ROTC Students.** - Grades 11 and 12  
8 students who are enrolled in the ROTC program shall be recognized as  
9 civilians in law.

10 **SEC. 17. ROTC Instructors' Capacity Development and**  
11 **Enhancement Program.** - There is hereby created and established a  
12 training program for ROTC instructors, to ensure that they meet the highest  
13 physical and moral standards to teach and carry out the ROTC program.  
14 The Instructors' Program shall be developed and administered under the  
15 guidance and tutelage of the DND and the DepEd.

16 A comprehensive training manual shall be developed for the conduct  
17 of these trainings, incorporating among other things, gender-appropriate  
18 and child-sensitive awareness, familiarity with relevant laws on the ROTC,  
19 Special Protection of Children, other domestic laws and international  
20 obligations necessary and appropriate to guaranty the integrity and the  
21 highest standard of moral scruple for the implementers' of the ROTC  
22 Program.

23 **SEC. 18. Budget Appropriation.** - The funding requirement  
24 necessary to implement the establishment, maintenance and operations of  
25 the Basic ROTC Program shall be included in the budget of the  
26 implementing agencies/departments, which is the DND and the DepEd, in  
27 the annual General Appropriations Act in the year following its enactment.

28 **SEC. 19. Implementing Rules.** - The DND and DepEd shall have the  
29 joint responsibility for the adoption of the implementing rules of this Act  
30 within sixty (60) days from the approval of this Act.

31 **SEC. 20. Transitory Provisions.** - In order to manage the initial  
32 implementation of the ROTC Program in senior high school, the DND, and



1 the DepEd shall within six (6) months from the effectivity of this Act, design,  
2 institute and implement a Pilot Program.

3 The DND and the DepEd shall jointly submit an annual review and  
4 evaluation report to Congress on the implementation of the Pilot Program.  
5 Upon review and approval by Congress, the framework utilized under the  
6 Pilot ROTC shall become the standard for the full national implementation of  
7 the Basic ROTC Program.

8 **SEC. 21. Joint Congressional Oversight Committee.** – A Joint  
9 Congressional Oversight Committee is hereby created to oversee, monitor  
10 and evaluate the implementation of this Act.

11 The Oversight Committee shall be composed of five (5) members each  
12 from the Senate and from the House of Representatives, including the  
13 Chairman of the Committee on Education, Arts and Culture of both Houses.  
14 The membership of the Committee of every House shall have at least two (2)  
15 opposition or minority members.

16 **SEC. 22. Mandatory Evaluation and Review** – The DND and the  
17 DepED shall jointly conduct an annual review and submit a report to  
18 Congress on the status of the implementation of the Basic ROTC Program  
19 one year after its full implementation.

20 **SEC. 23. Penal Provisions.** – Offenses committed by persons involved  
21 in or in relation to the implementation of this Act shall be subject to  
22 penalties in accordance with the applicable laws, rules and regulations.  
23 Grades 11 and 12 students undergoing the Basic ROTC Program must not  
24 be subjected to military law.

25 **SEC. 24. Offenses Punishable Under Existing Laws.** – For acts  
26 already penalized under existing laws such as corruption, graft, hazing,  
27 sexual harassment, and other abuses committed by persons authorized to  
28 administer the Basic ROTC and deployment of the Corps, the maximum  
29 penalty imposable under existing laws shall be imposed.

30 **SEC. 25. Separability Clause.** – If any provision of this Act is held  
31 invalid or unconstitutional, the other provisions not so declared shall  
32 remain in force and effect.

1           **SEC. 26. Amendatory Clause.** – Section 38 and 39 of Republic Act  
2 No. 7077 and Section 4 of Republic Act 9163, are hereby deemed amended  
3 and modified accordingly.

4           **SEC. 27. Repealing Clause.** – All other laws, executive orders,  
5 presidential decrees, rules and regulations inconsistent with any provisions  
6 of this Act are hereby repealed, amended or modified accordingly.

7           **SEC. 28. Effectivity.** - This Act shall take effect fifteen (15) days  
8 following its publication in at least two (2) newspapers of general  
9 circulation.
